A Call To Action

As I sit here thinking about where we are as a community and the activities of the board; I am always amazed. I guess I shouldn't be as I have witnessed our great God come through again and again with His Holy Spirit being present in our community, walks and activities. The latest examples being when we as a board called upon the community (actually it was the community rising up and following where God was leading them) to support two efforts recently and the response has been almost overwhelming! We are not only going to be able to provide new bunks at Clay City, but many new mattresses as well. How many years have we endured the old rickety bunks and now the upcoming walks and many walks to come as well as many future camp activities will reap the benefit of a community called to action. The lack of the right kitchen utensils is another effort. The plea was put out to the community and the response was there to provide the tools necessary for the kitchen to do their job! Well, I hesitate to do it again, but I am once again putting out a call to action for our community. I reference John 15:16 which says "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit; fruit that will last. Then the Father will give you whatever you ask in my name." This effort or call has two phases to it. The first is a bit easier. We as a board have stepped out in faith to put on Winter walks in 2017. Obviously to do that, we will need pilgrims. I don't feel that we have always "advertised" our community and our walks to reach as many as we could. So, what the board is asking is to communicate to a board member, churches that have had nobody or just one or two who have attended a walk. We would like to reach out to these churches and see if a board member could come in and talk about Emmaus one Sunday to see if we can pull more churches into the mix. So if you know of anybody that attends a church that fits this criteria, of no or very few congregation members having been on a walk, please let one of us know via email or phone.

The second phase is a little more involved on your part, and that is a call to sponsorship. This is not something to be taken lightly. Sponsorship involves a large time commitment if done right. We don't want to fill our walks with just warm

bodies, we want to fill our walks with those that the Lord is calling to be there and that only happens thru prayer and discernment. So, this is a call to prayer and then action to follow where the Lord may be leading you to bear some fruit; fruit that will last. We have a challenge ahead of us to allow the Lord to lead us to those he has picked to fill the walks we have scheduled in faith. If you need help with sponsorship, let a board member know and they will either go over the responsibilities in detail or get you a sponsorship book.

In closing, I would like to thank you for the privilege of serving this community as your Community Lay Director for the past two years. This will be my last newsletter article I will write in this role. What a blessing this has been and the Lord has grown me in my faith thru this experience. My prayer is that I have not gotten in the way of what God has tried to accomplish thru His disciples using this community. May the Peace of God be with you always!

What makes a good board member?

- 1) First and foremost, a good board member is prayerful and discerning of God's will. We cannot forget the Cannon we read so often when we work a walk. This is God's instrument and he uses us to accomplish His will. It can be so easy for us to get in His way.
- 2) Next, I have observed how helpful it has been to have members that are very experienced in all aspects of the weekend. A good mixture of past LD's, Head Cha's, Head Kitchen and Music has been very helpful in the decision making process. We also have a very diverse mixture from an occupation standpoint.
- 3) A Board position is one that does have an element of time commitment to it. A good Board member is one that is committed to and has a schedule that allows them the time to do their board jobs. Remember the priorities talk; make sure that your schedule will allow the Board position to fall in line with God's will.
- 4) A good Board member also needs to have a collaborative attitude. The ability to process all of the elements of a decision is important. What does not work is a "my way or the highway" attitude. A good question to ask yourself is do I on a regular basis put myself in the other person's shoes and see things from their perspective.
- 5) Lastly, I have observed compassionate Christians that are willing and able to meet difficult issues head on and deal with the one of a kind, one time problems and issues by having a one on one conversation with the Cannon as the core of those conversations. This difficult task is not for everyone, but is necessary when you are dealing with a fallen world.

Make a Friend, Be a Friend, Bring a Friend to Christ

Sponsorship is one of the most rewarding things we do in Emmaus. If you think all of the churches have been tapped in the Wabash Valley, think again! There are several churches that could truly benefit from the Walk to Emmaus to help in discipleship growth. We both urge you to seek God and have Him direct you to someone that you could invite to go on this transforming weekend.

Pray that God will reveal someone to you that would enjoy the message of the walk weekend. Kathy shared this: "I was working out in the schools one evening and ran into a colleague. We started talking and I know the Holy Spirit was there with us. She said that she had noticed my consistent walk over the time she knew me and wanted to know more about my story. I began sharing my love of God with her and explaining a little bit about the Emmaus Walk. She was immediately drawn to my genuine enthusiasm and gratitude how God met me at Clay City that fall weekend. Soon thereafter, she and her husband met with my husband and me for dinner where we explained the Walk to Emmaus. The rest is history and this couple has truly been blessed by the love of God and the Emmaus team (like so many have for years!)."

Here are some tips Kathy suggests. "Start early and gather agape notes and cards. It is good to aim for 10-15 letters, notes, emails, or cards. I like to bundle the personal notes in a beautiful ribbon (which is very traditional from the early El Shaddai walks but not necessary). It is simply something that I like to do. My pilgrims always remark how special that extra touch means to them."

She adds, "Before the walk, I give them a list of things that they may and may not bring to the walk explaining the rationale for each. I make sure they understand the reason for being "unplugged" from all electronics and watches. While many table leaders do that, they always appreciate the thorough list, which makes them feel most prepared and less anxious. In the weeks before, I make plans to pick them up (remember, they do not drive themselves!) so we are there at 6:00-6:30 PM for registration. Please do NOT come earlier as the team is not ready to receive them. I will have a special server who will serve them at the agape dinner as well as either myself or a designated person to pray for them at Thursday's sponsors' hour and Saturday candlelight prayer time."

Sue and Kathy make sure that the agape letters are brought down with them on Thursday or Saturday. We often choose to give them a special commemorative agape gift when we take them home after the closing program. There is no room in the small agape sacks for anything but the agape letters and notes so leave it in the car for the ride home.

Sue reminds sponsors to please remember to be present at the sponsors' hour on Thursday evening, Saturday agape dinner (if serving or having someone else there to serve), Saturday evening prayer time, Saturday candlelight, and Sunday closing ceremonies. You will take communion with them at the closing ceremony, which is always very special. You will enjoy the ride home sharing all of the great moments of the weekend with them.

At the close of the weekend, your sponsorship role has really just begun, as you must accompany your pilgrim to their first gathering. Encourage them in their spiritual growth journey in their Fourth Days and pray, pray, and pray for them. Sponsorship is truly a blessing, but it requires your total commitment of discipleship. The walks depend on strong Christians wanting to reach out to help others in their spiritual growth journey. Are you one of those Christian big brothers or sisters?

A Message from the Registrars

Our registrars work diligently to review applications and mail out timely notices. Good sponsorship includes reviewing and making sure that your pilgrim and sponsor applications are complete. They have provided a few suggestions to help us help them.

1. Applications can only be processed if both the front and back page are completed and the \$35.00 deposit included. (There have been instances where shirt size, sponsors walk number and community (if not El Shaddai), and male or female information have been omitted. Please – leave no blank unfilled.
2. Please use only blue or black ink, printing legibly so all letters and numbers are clear.
3. Please advise if your pilgrim has dietary or special needs in order for the team to be prepared to address those needs.
4. Always include your walk number next to your name on the sponsor's portion of the application.
5. When you receive your sponsor letter, your pilgrim should have their letter. Please contact them to verify and answer any questions they may have. If you are unsure of the answer to their questions, please contact Nancy or Sue. Verify that they have returned their card and if not encourage them to do so

WHAT WORKING KAIROS MEANS TO ME

When I was working as a Correctional Officer at the Putnamville Correctional Facility in the late 1980s, it never occurred to me that God would call me to work in a prison ministry someday, coming into a facility as a volunteer. He has a way of using people for His glory and blessing them in the process, and that is exactly what happened to me when I worked my first Kairos Weekend #10 at the Rockville Correctional Facility in 2009.

Just as each of you know because of your having attended the Walk to Emmaus, this 3 ½ day weekend is life-changing - not just for those making the Walk (or Weekend, as we call it in Kairos) - but also for those on the team. I knew after I worked that first Weekend that I would be back.

Why?

Because I saw how God worked through the volunteers to bring His love, His grace, and His mercy to a population often forgotten by the outside world. It gave me the perspective that it doesn't matter who you are and what you've done, God can and will show His love unconditionally.

We often forget that we are all sinners and although it might be easy for us to judge those who are behind bars, we are no different in God's eyes. Romans 3:23 says: "We have all sinned and fall short of the glory of God." And in 5:8: "But God demonstrates His love for us while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." He died for all of us. Not just for those of us who are free on the outside - but every single person on this earth.

Our privilege is to convey this love to those who are behind bars, and by sharing the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ, Kairos hopes to change hearts, transform lives, and impact the world. The impact of Kairos is evident in these words from a Kairos graduate: "Kairos gave me a reason to live. I believe that, had I not come to know God's love, I probably would not be here today. How else could a person with two life sentences survive the horrors of prison life? All things are possible with God. Without Him, many of us don't make it. It was because of Kairos that I got to know God, and ultimately, I was given the chance to live." What a powerful testimony as to the power of this program!

This year, Kairos is celebrating its 40th year, and during that time, over a quarter of a million lives have been impacted. I thank God for the vision of the men who began this ministry in Florida in 1976, patterning it after the Cursillo movement. In 1979, the name Kairos was adopted and the ministry became an independent, non-profit, ecumenical Christian organization. The word "Kairos" is a Greek term meaning, "God's special time," and in the seven years that I have been involved with Kairos, I have truly seen and personally experienced the impact of God's special time on the lives of the offenders at Rockville. The next Weekend at Rockville - #25 - will be November 3-6.
