A Word from your Community Lay Director

So What will be the story you tell?

So our adult Sunday School Class was doing a study by Andy Stanley called "Your Move." It is a study about four questions you should ask when faced with a decision you need to make in life. In one of the lessons, he makes the observation; about virtually every decision we make in life. And, that observation is that in 3 – 5 years down the road from it; when we go to talk about it with anyone or tell our story, no matter how crucial or gut wrenching we think a decision is at the time we make it, it will all be reduced down to three or four sentences in a story you tell. And his real point was to ask yourself in a significant decision-making time, "What story do I (you) want to tell?" We get to write our story, decision by decision! Regardless of circumstances that may impact our lives, we get to write the kind of story we will tell about the decisions we made in the midst of all of these circumstances!

So, why am I writing about this? What does this have to do with Emmaus? Well, for me, I can say that since my Emmaus experience I have trusted God and involved Him a lot more in my decisions. I can say with certainty that my stories since my walk are far better and easier to tell than many prior to. There are some decisions in my live that quite frankly I would love to be able to rewind the clock and write them to go in a different direction. Those same stories are difficult to tell without a bit of hurt or embarrassment and maybe even a temptation to omit parts of the story. So again, why am I telling you these things?

Emmaus almost always has a profound positive impact on people's lives that attend. It did on mine. So how can we help change the stories people tell to be more in line with what God wants them to be? How do we help to get God involved in writing more positive stories? Well first, how much time do we spend praying about who God may want to change through Emmaus? That is the first step. Second, do we witness to people about the impact Emmaus can have? Many times it is not the words we say, but the actions we display. So many times, those actions with God's help will present the opportunity to be an advocate. So do we allow Him to use us? Third, do we present Emmaus to friends, co-workers, fellow church members? I don't mean to imply we should be pushy or abrasive, but gentle nudges when prompted by the Spirit never turned anyone off to Emmaus. Share the Emmaus experience. We have nothing to hide. Even if you tell them what happens on the weekend in

general terms to ease their uncertainty, you won't give the weekend away.

Why am I asking these questions? Well, we have struggled to fill walks the past two plus years and I hate to have opportunities for God to change lives be missed with open pilgrim spots on walks. I want nothing more than to be able to have three full men's and three full women's walks each year. That is the potential for 216 lives each year to be impacted through God's work at Emmaus. And we know how that can change many more lives just through those 216 lives reaching out and touching people through new stores being written trusting in their God. Sponsorship is a huge responsibility that should not be taken lightly. But with a community approaching 7,000 members that have gone on the walk, we surely can positively impact our community for the good by filling six walks a year. Please prayerfully consider who God may be calling you to sponsor, and then act on it!

As we prepared for the trip I felt like I knew the people who were the “real leaders” and those who were just “tag-alongs”. I also had discerned those of us with real theological insight compared to those who were simply followers.


But something happened during those ten days. God allowed me to see His grace working through each person in unique and wonderful ways. Humility set in and the hierarchy of best to least simply faded away. We were a team. We worked together, worshipped together, prayed together and were fed together. I know that was Jesus’ plan all along. He didn’t issue individual assignments. He allowed each to use the gifts they were given and then applied His grace to each.

God anointed each person on that team to be a witness to hope and salvation. He does that. He gives wisdom and power to those who share The Good News. Just look around and see the lives that are being blessed by everyday people, people like you and me who let the world know they are loved by simply living lives that show grace and compassion to those around them.

Jesus didn’t issue individual assignments. He didn’t move one-by-one down the line and knight each individual. He did, however, say in Acts 1:8, “You – *all* of you collectively – shall be my witnesses!”

Sponsorship – a Privilege and an Honor

Sponsorship is one of the most exciting things we do in Emmaus. Sharing the joy that I experienced on my own walk over 20 years ago is still one of the rewarding experiences from Walk 15. Let me share with you some tips that have helped me to sponsor successfully.

Pray that God will reveal someone to you that would enjoy the message of the walk. I was walking one morning with a co-worker sharing my love of God with them and explaining a little bit about the Emmaus Walk. She was immediately drawn to my genuine enthusiasm and gratitude how God met me at Clay City that fall weekend. We met soon thereafter, and over lunch, I explained the weekend to her in-depth without going into every detail. I asked her for the name of a best friend and a local family member whom I contacted immediately for agape letters. It’s good to aim for 10-15 letters, notes, emails or cards. I like to bundle the personal notes in a beautiful ribbon (which is very traditional from the early El Shaddai walks, but not necessary). It is simply something that I like to do. My pilgrims always remark how special that extra touch means to them.

Before the walk, I give them a list of things that they may and may not bring to the walk explaining the rationale for each. I make sure they understand being “unplugged” from all electronics and watches. While many table leaders do that, they always appreciate the thorough list, which makes them feel most prepared and less anxious. In the weeks before, I make plans to pick them up (remember, they do not drive themselves!) so we are there at 6:00-6:30 p.m. for registration. Please do NOT come earlier as the team is not ready to receive them. I will have a special server who will serve them at the agape dinner; as well as either myself or a designated person to pray for them at Thursday’s sponsors’ hour and Saturday candlelight prayer time.

I make sure that the agape letters are brought down with me on Thursday or Saturday. I often choose to give them a special commemorative agape gift when I take them home after the closing program. There is no room in the small agape sacks for anything but the agape letters and notes so leave it in the car for the ride home.

Please remember to be present at the sponsors’ hour on Thursday evening, Saturday agape dinner (if serving or have someone else there to serve), Saturday evening prayer time, Saturday candlelight, and Sunday closing ceremonies. You will take communion with them at the closing ceremony, which is always very special. You will enjoy the ride home sharing all of the great moments of the weekend with them.

At the close of the weekend, your sponsorship role has really just begun; as you must accompany your pilgrim to their first gathering. Encourage them in their spiritual growth journey in their Fourth Days and pray, pray, and pray for them. Sponsorship is truly a blessing, but it requires your total commitment of discipleship. The Walks depend on strong Christians wanting to reach out to help others in their spiritual growth journey. Are you one of those Christian big brothers or sisters?

As members of the Emmaus Community and Christians we've heard that phrase echoed many times. It occurred to me that sentiment was more endearing to me after I had completed my winter walk (104), February 25-29, 2004 in Merom, Indiana. Kent Bass was the Lay Director.

I was blessed to have taken that walk with my son Matthew. We loved our God and each other dearly. However, as father and son, we had some baggage that needed to be addressed. Dying Moments took it away and I'll never forget that embrace with Matt when pastor Bill Coker took the basket filled with torment out of the room and announced it was gone as far as the east is from the west.

The Walk to Emmaus changed our lives. That's not to say everything was perfect in our Fourth Days. There were challenges and setbacks. I experienced numerous medical problems. Matt experienced some emotional concerns and personal problems. Through it all we leaned on our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ for strength and guidance.

October 25, 2008, my wife Linda and I were attending the Emmaus candlelight for Walk 111 in Merom. Our dear friend Steve Stipp was Lay Director. While we were making our way to the chapel for communion we were informed Matt had been involved in a car accident. Immediately, we drove to the nearby Sullivan County Hospital. The accident had taken place just a few miles north of the Merom Conference Center.

At the hospital a very compassionate, young, Dr. Carl Conwell entered the room where we had been waiting. As gently as he could he informed Linda and I that our only child, our precious son, the husband of our wonderful daughter-in-law Jenny and the father of our beautiful grandchildren did not survive his injuries. He died instantly in a single car accident and instantly, our lives changed.

A flood of shock, sorrow, denial and incredible loss filled our bodies and minds. While we tarried there with Matt by our side, his soul gone to heaven, our church Pastor, Aaron Wheaton and his wife Cynthia were ushered into the room. They had attended candlelight for Walk 111. Soon dear friends who had also attended the candlelight joined us. We prayed for Matt as a group and individually.

In the waiting room a group of Emmaus brothers and sisters, also from the candlelight service, formed a prayer circle holding hands and praying for our beloved son and our family.

Suddenly, through my tear filled eyes I realized that the coroner was wrong. Matt had survived his injuries. Because of the incredible outpouring of love from the Emmaus community and our church family the promise from the scripture John 3:16 came shining through. Matt had not perished. He had entered his everlasting life with Jesus.

Many of you who read this know our story. It has become Linda and my witness. Once, I asked our dear friend and Pastor Dr. Dan Willis how many times do we tell our story? His reply was 100 times and then start over.

The joy, comfort and fellowship that our Emmaus Pastors, Emmaus brothers and sisters in Christ and our church family bless us with has sustained us to this day.

Our story is not unique. There are countless stories like ours. As followers of Jesus Christ we need to insure through our witness and love of God that we continue to support our Emmaus community by working walks and proclaiming the good news of Emmaus so those pilgrims-in-waiting can take that closer walk with our God right here on earth. I submit to you:

“EMMAUS IS GOOD – ALL THE TIME *and* ALL THE TIME – EMMAUS IS GOOD!”

But, as time went on God did change my heart, and I began to realize just how awesome my Walk to Emmaus was. I truly wanted to have a closer and more personal walk with Him.


What have I done since then?
